Thank you for your e-mail (Ref. <u>Ares(2019)3584735</u>) in which you are asking if cannabis could be labelled as organic according to the EU regulations.

Article 1(2) of Regulation (EC) No 834/2007¹ lays down the scope of organic legislation, which covers products placed on the market as "live or unprocessed agricultural products", "processed agricultural products used for food", "feed" and "vegetative propagating material and seeds for cultivation".

Agricultural products are listed in Annex I to the Treaty of the Functioning of the European Union (TFEU). Hemp (Cannabis sativa) is an agricultural product covered by Annex I of the TFEU. Therefore, hemp (Cannabis sativa) used for food or feed may be certified as organic provided that the rules on production and labelling set out in Regulation (EC) No 834/2007 and Regulation (EC) No 889/2008² are complied with.

In addition, kindly note that cannabis plants may require permission for cultivation for medical, scientific, industrial or horticultural purposes³.

I would therefore recommend you to contact the competent national authorities in the Member State in which you intend to cultivate it to verify the specific conditions to be fulfilled.

³ Cannabis is listed in Schedules I and IV of the United Nations 1961 Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs; its cultivation, supply and possession can be allowed only for 'medical and scientific purposes'.
