I would like to thank you for your e-mail¹ of 18 October 2021 on the flavourings authorised in organic products. Please accept my apologies for the late reply.


In accordance with point 2.2.2 (b) of Part IV of Annex II to Regulation (EU) 2018/848² only some flavourings may be used in the processed organic food:

- they must correspond to the substances and products defined in points (c) and (d)(i) of Article 3(2) of Regulation (EC) No 1334/2008³
- they must have been labelled, when sold to the food producers, as natural flavouring substances or as natural flavouring preparations in accordance with Article 16(2), (3) and (4) of Regulation (EC) No 1334/2008.

Flavourings that have been labelled in accordance with Article 16(2), (3) <u>and</u> (4) of Regulation (EC) No 1334/2008 must have the following characteristics as mentioned in that Regulation:

- the flavouring component must comprise only flavouring preparations and/or natural flavouring substances,
- the flavouring component of the flavouring substances must contain exclusively natural flavouring substances, <u>and</u>
- the flavouring component has to be obtained exclusively or by at least 95 % by w/w from the source material that reflect the flavour of taste of the flavouring component.
